When Algee King-Providence received the news that she had been awarded a scholarship from the Island Scholars Programme, it felt like a divine breakthrough.



For this determined scholar, that door led to far more than just academic success—it opened the way to purpose, personal resilience, and an evergrowing dream.

Now pursuing a master's degree in Forensic Psychology while also running her own luxury tea business, Algee credits the Island Scholars Programme as the launchpad for everything she's currently accomplishing. "The scholarship made higher education more accessible and gave me the confidence to dream big and follow through," she shares. "It wasn't just a financial boost—it was a foundation."

Balancing work, school, and home life proved challenging, with tuition costs adding significant pressure. But the scholarship came as both a relief and a reminder. "It helped me greatly in the financial regard, but also emotionally. The support from Island Scholars reminded me that I had earned my place and that I wasn't alone. That reassurance helped me stay grounded and resilient."

Algee's long-term goal is to become a PhD Psychologist. And while she continues to work toward that vision, she's already putting her knowledge to use—not only in her studies, but in her everyday life and in how she supports others around her.

"To the Island Scholars Organisation and sponsors, thank you," she said. "You didn't just fund an education—you helped build a future".





For Shanka Edwards, the path to becoming a physician was far from straightforward. What is typically a four-year academic journey took her six years, shaped by setbacks and financial challenges. Yet, hers is a story defined by perseverance and resilience.

It took three attempts before she successfully matched into a residency programme in the United States. Through each hurdle, it was her determination—and the unwavering support of those around her—that kept her moving forward. The Island Scholars Programme played a vital role in her journey, offering more than just financial assistance. "Mr Ron Rose played a pivotal role," she said. "Not only by easing the financial burden but also by introducing me to his network of professionals, which proved invaluable in my pursuit of a family medicine residency."

Like many aspiring medical professionals, Shanka encountered a number of unexpected expenses on the road to earning her degree. While preparing to relocate to the United States for clinical rotations, she came across the Island Scholars scholarship. Despite not initially meeting all the criteria, she applied—and was deeply grateful when Mr Rose reached out to inform her of her selection. Today, Shanka proudly serves as a first-year family medicine resident in the United States. She credits the Island Scholars Programme as a cornerstone of her success, a source of both opportunity and encouragement during some of her most defining moments.
